Dear Ascension Family,

Blessings of peace and good health! I hope everybody was able to read the Letter of our Bishop, Most Reverend Robert J. Brennan. The subject of the letter could serve as a good topic for our conversations and discussions at home, at work, and group gatherings, especially in this liturgical season we are in.

Next week, I will be sharing with you more information about what Bishop Brennan's letter spells out.

We are in the season of Advent. "Prepare" is the main message for these days, but scripture's meaning and emphasis stands in sharp contrast to our frantic, stress-filled preparations these weeks before Christmas. Many of us are probably caught up in preparations for Christmas with daily reminders of the number of shopping days before Christmas. What a contrast to the call to "prepare" which we hear in the gospel reading today.

The Church's call to celebrate Advent properly seems like "a voice crying out in the desert." Advent seems lost in the rush of Christmas celebrations. Christmas caroling and parties by schools and offices, as well as churches, are taking place. There are practical reasons why it is this way. Although it is liturgically correct to delay singing Christmas carols until Christmas Eve, you cannot really plan many Christmas events between December 25 and the Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord, the actual days of the Christmas season. Schools are closed as are many offices during the week between Christmas and New Year. People are on vacation, or simply out of town. The parish which is strict about keeping Advent seems to be out-of-step with the rest of the world. So, how do we keep a proper celebration of Advent with its message of "Prepare the way of the Lord?"

John the Baptist, who would probably be considered some kind of weirdo in our day, comes upon the scene with urgent message from Isaiah's prophecy: "prepare the way of the Lord." John the Baptist fulfilled the prophecies of the Old Testament about God's messenger who would announce the coming of the long-awaited Messiah, as the gospel reading todav tells us.

John the Baptist preaches a fiery message of a "baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sin." This baptism is different from Christian baptism that we have, which is a sacrament of God's grace. John's baptism is a sign of repentance, which for us is our response to God's call to receive Christ into our lives. The Greek work for repentance is metanoia, which literally means "turning around facing another direction." It is no casual saving of "I am sorry" or "Pardon me." It is an honest and thorough and often painful soul-searching. It is a deep awareness of the need for God's cleansing power in our lives. It marks a new beginning made possible by a loving God. It means new priorities and values, a new way of looking at the world. God wants to change us in order to bring us joy and peace and fulfillment. Because we continue to fail, repentance is a daily experience for us. God's faithful love and mercy reach out to us every day.

"Prepare the way of the Lord!" John the Baptist calls on each of us to stop in the middle of our frantic preparations for Christmas to hear the message of Advent. We are called to examine ourselves, to repent and turn daily in a new direction - towards God. God calls us to "prepare," but not only in the ways of modern society. Advent and Christmas are wonderful times of the year. Parties and family gatherings and the giving and exchanging of gifts are part of the joy of this season. But let us commit ourselves to celebrating Advent properly with its message, "Prepare the way of the Lord."

EUCARISTIC REVIVAL 2022-2024 EXPLANATION OF THE MASS

After a series of short catechesis on the sacrament of the Eucharist, we will now have a series of short explanation of the different parts of the Mass.

Lectionary & Evangelarium: The Lectionary is the liturgical book which contains all the readings for the Mass. The word comes from the latin legere which means "to read." The Evangelarium, or Book of the Gospels, which may be used on Sundays and Solemnities, is the book that contains only the readings of the Gospel. The word Gospel, from the Old English Good and Spel, means "Good News." It is the literal translation of the Latin Evangelium, hence the Book of the Gospel is also called Evangelarium.

Weekday Readings: The weekday readings are divided into two-year cycle: Cycle One for the odd-numbered years (example 2019, 2021, etc.); and Cycle Two for the even-numbered years (example 2018, 2020, etc.). The purpose of the weekday readings is to proclaim in two years the major passages of the Scriptures, from the Book of Genesis to the Book of Revelation. The weekday Mass has no second reading. The Gospel readings are arranged so that portions of all four Gospels are read every year, and they remain the same in the two cycles.

Eucharistic Revival (continuation)

Sunday Readings: The *Sunday readings* are divided into **three-year cycle: Year A** (centered on the Gospel of Matthew); **Year B** (centered on Mark); and **Year C** (centered on Luke). The first week of Advent marks the beginning of the liturgical year with the corresponding Sunday readings. For instance, 2022 is Year C; 2023 is Year A; 2024 is Year B; and so on. In the Sunday readings, the First Reading and the Responsorial Psalm are connected with the Gospel, while the Second Reading, usually taken from the Letters of St. Paul, has a theme of its own.

The Ambo: The *Ambo*, from the Greek word *ambon* meaning "mountain," is an elevated lectern or pulpit from which the Liturgy of the Word is proclaimed. The Ambo reminds us of a holy mountain because, in the Old Testament, God spoke to Moses from Mount Horeb-Sinai (Exodus 3:1-3); and in the New Testament, Jesus spoke to his disciples from the Mount of Beatitudes (Matthew 5:1-2). The Ambo ought to be solemn and majestic, and exclusively reserved for the Liturgy of the Word. A much smaller lectern should be used by the commentator or by other ministers.

Saint's Corner:

St. Lucy December 13

Lucy lived around the year 300. We know few facts about her. She came from a wealthy family in Sicily. She had become a Christian and she loved the Lord Jesus deeply enough to give her life totally to his service. This one fact says a great deal about her.

According to a story, Lucy brought food at night to her fellow Christians in hiding because of persecution. To keep her hands free to carry these provisions and to light her way, she balanced candles on her head. This is the origin of the Swedish custom in which a young daughter begins the Christmas season by bringing coffee and cakes to her family in the morning of this day with lights wreathed in her hair.

Another fact about her life is that a man wanting to be her husband was enraged and reported her of being a Christian to the authorities. She was arrested, tortured and then put to death after having her eyes plucked out.

We all remember the injunction of our parents to take care of our eyes. Just as we can lose eyesight, we can also lose the gift of faith. St. Lucy represents all the people of faith in our world today, young and old, whose faith is a light in the darkness.

One can easily imagine what a young Christian woman had to contend with in pagan Sicily in the year 300. If you have trouble imagining, just glance at today's pleasure-at-all cost world and the barriers it presents against leading a good Christian life.

Veneration of St. Lucy spread throughout the early Church. Now Lucy is mainly invoked by those who suffer from eye ailments.
