From the Pastor's Desk

Second Sunday of Lent February 25, 2024 Mark 9:2-10 Dear Ascension Family,

Blessings of peace and good health!

The gospel reading today is about the Transfiguration of Jesus. It took place right after Jesus told his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem to suffer and die. When Peter heard Jesus say this, he cried out, "God forbid, Lord! No such thing shall ever happen to you."

This might be Peter's way of showing his love and concern for Jesus. But unknown to him, with these words he was reiterating Satan's objective when he tempted Jesus three times - to deviate from his mission. That is why Jesus then said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle to me. You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do."

Jesus knew what was in the mind and heart of Peter. Thus after six days, he invited him along with James and John to go up with him on the mountain. There Jesus was transfigured before them, "His face shone like the sun and his clothes became white as light." The dazzling whiteness of Jesus' clothes symbolizes the brightness of God's glory. The Book of Revelation uses this same symbolism when it says that in heaven the blessed will be "robed all in white" (Rev. 3:5).

Peter was so fascinated by this wonderful experience that he wanted to prolong it. Peter's suggestion to prolong the dazzling vision was immediately followed by the descent of the cloud. In Scripture the cloud is the symbol of God's presence (see Exodus 24:15ff; Acts 1:9). Then a voice from the cloud was heard saying, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased. Fernando Velazquez Maria San Pedro Parish Trustees Jesus however, ignored Peter's proposal. Instead he asked them to go down the mountain so that he could go on with his journey to Jerusalem to fulfill what his Father willed.

The concluding words, "Listen to him," express the significance of this mystery for Jesus' friends: not only for the three present on the mountain with him, but for all the friends of Jesus, ourselves included. We the friends and followers of Jesus, are the company of those who listen to his words. Jesus does not grant us, any more than he granted to Peter, James, and John, the continuous vision of this glory. We live not on the mountain top of great spiritual experiences, but in the valley of life's ordinary duties, where we have to listen to Jesus.

Jesus speaks to us in many ways: in the Holy Scriptures, in the teaching of his Church, through the circumstances of daily life, in the promptings of conscience, and in the needs of those we encounter along life's way. In the world to come it will be different. There we shall **see** the Lord. In this world, however, we live by faith, and not by sight.

This is the way Jesus lived. How bitterly his faith was tested as he passed through death's dark valley, expressed in his anguished cry on the cross: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Jesus calls us to follow him on the way of the cross: to endure whatever trials and sufferings life may bring. The way of the cross will lead us, as it led Jesus, through suffering to death. But beyond death for us, as for him, is resurrection to life eternal. The Transfiguration was Jesus' way of preparing his disciples for the trying days ahead. They should not lose heart, having seen him transfigured and glorious, and announced by the Father as his own beloved Son.

In his proposal to Jesus to stay on the mountain of glory for good, Peter was in effect saying, "No cross, only the crown." But this was not to be. We cannot escape the suffering of the cross in life, but Jesus gives meaning to the crosses we bear: in such crosses lie the kernel of victory in Jesus' resurrection. If we constantly listen to Jesus and reflect on what he himself went through, then when sufferings come our way, as they have and will, we can bear them in a spirit of faith, with our own transfiguration in mind. The challenge for us everyday is to live our life by the light of the truth - "No cross, no crown!"

EUCARISTIC REVIVAL 2022-2024 EXPLANATION OF THE MASS

After a series of short catechesis on the sacrament of the Eucharist, we will now have a series of short explanation of the different parts of the Mass.

Lamb of God: The Lamb of God, or in Latin Agnus Dei, is a Christological hymn inspired by the words uttered by St. John the Baptist at the River Jordan. When he saw Jesus, he proclaimed: "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world"(John 1:29). In the Old Testament, lambs were sacrificed in celebration of the Passover which commemorates the slavery of the Israelites in Egypt and their "passing over" to freedom in the promised land; in the New Testament, Jesus is declared as the true Lamb of God who makes possible the crossing from sin and death to the eternal life. In the Book of Revelation, Jesus is represented as a victorious Lamb, who was slain but now lives forever (Revelation 5:6).

Breaking of the Eucharistic Bread: During the Lamb of God, the priest breaks the Eucharistic Bread, and drops a portion of it into the chalice to signify communion with the Pope in Rome. At the time of the Apostles, it was a tradition to bring a portion of the consecrated Bread to the Pope, and to drop it into his chalice, to signify communion with him. When it became impossible to travel to Rome, the priests were required to drop a portion of the consecrated Bread into their chalice. (Continuation on page of Saint's Corner)

Eucharistic Revival (continuation)

Elevation of the Host: The *Elevation of the Host* is done to profess our faith in the real presence of Jesus in the Sacred Species ("This is the Lamb of God..."), and also to acknowledge our unworthiness in receiving him ("Lord, I am not worthy...). This is done to commemorate the Roman Centurion of Capernaum, who pleaded with Jesus for healing his servant. When Jesus proposed to visit his home the Centurion replied: "Lord, I am not worthy to have you enter under my roof; only say the word and my servant will be healed." And Jesus praised him saying: "In no one in Israel have I found such a faith" (Matthew 8:5-10).

Saint's Corner:

St. Peter Damian February 21

Peter Damian was born in Ravenna, Italy, in 1007. His brother, who was archpriest of Ravenna, sent him for a first class education. He became a teacher.

Already as a student, he demonstrated a deep piety. He wore a hair shirt under his clothes to mortify his flesh and keep his sexual urges under control, spent many hours in prayer, and fasted rigorously.

Later on, after a few years spent in the teaching profession, at the age of 28 he became a Benedictine monk. Eight years later, Peter Damian was unanimously chosen by the other monks to become their abbot.

Peter Damian lived at a time that some historians have called the darkest age for the Church. This is how John Fink describes that Church in his book on the Doctors of the Church: "The State, whether Italy or Germany, controlled Church affairs. This control began with Charlemagne in the ninth century and reverted to powerful Roman families in the tenth century. Church officials could not even elect the pope. Until 962 one or another Roman family chose the pope, usually a member of that family. The popes were secular men, usually more intent on furthering their families' finances than caring for the Church. The clerical vocation became a quick route to wealth and power. Clerical marriage and concubinage were prevalent and in some places the episcopacy itself became a hereditary position filled by a bishop's son. Religious practices among the clergy declined as corruption among the clergy grew. Preaching was largely discontinued and sacraments were neglected."

Peter Damian began to work at the reform of the Church at large. This he did primarily by writing extensively against the many vices prominent among the clergy and encouraged the popes in their efforts at reforming the Church. When he was made cardinal-bishop of Ostia, Peter Damian worked hard to reform his clergy.

Peter Damian reminds us that true reform of the Church begins with oneself. Before working at the reform of the Church, Peter Damian started off by reforming himself, making sure he himself was trying his best to be faithful to Christ - and kept at it throughout his life.
